

What are Degree Apprenticeships?

What are Degree Apprenticeships?

- Degree Apprenticeships combine degree level study and a workplace apprenticeship at the same time
- They typically last between three and six years
- Apprentices work for at least 30 hours per week
- University study could be a certain number of days per week, or apprentices could complete 'blocks' of university study
- Apprentices are paid a salary (which can be used for living costs) and the employer covers tuition fee costs. There is no maintenance loan
- Many students secure employment with the same employer once their apprenticeship is finished (though this is not a guarantee)



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Qualification levels

- Level 2 GCSEs, some BTECs, Intermediate Apprenticeships
- Level 3 A levels, T levels, most BTECs, Advanced Apprenticeships
- Level 4 first year of a 'normal' degree, Higher Apprenticeships
- Level 5 second year of a 'normal' degree
- Level 6 'normal' degree or most Degree Apprenticeships
- Level 7 Master's degree and some Degree Apprenticeships

Degree apprenticeship or traditional degree?

- Gone are the days when apprenticeships were seen as something for those who are not "academic enough" to go to university
- If anything, the selection process for a Degree Apprenticeships may be more demanding than for a 'normal' degree
- Make sure that your highest achieving students are considering degree apprenticeships
- Students are perfectly entitled to apply for both a degree apprenticeship and a traditional degree at the same time if they wish to hedge their bets (in fact this is a very sensible thing to do)

Degree apprenticeship or traditional degree?

- There are both pros and cons of taking a more vocational route as opposed to a more academic one
- Apprentices are primarily employees who spend some of their time studying as students (not the other way around!)
- Prospective apprentices need to be realistic about the fact that the lifestyle of the average employee may be different from the lifestyle of the average student

- Apprentices don't pay tuition fees at all, however traditional degree students don't have to pay anything upfront
- Apprentices get paid a salary by the employer, typically in the region of £17k-£24k
- Students should not be making big life decisions on the basis of money alone
- Young people should not feel obliged to start contributing to the family household finances at age 18!
- It's impossible to know precisely how much a 'normal' degree will cost

Financial benefits of university study

- Recent analysis from the Institute for Fiscal Studies suggests that the average graduate tends to be at least £100,000 better off over the course of their lifetime compared to nongraduates (for cohorts born in the mid to late 1980s)
- However, the same analysis finds that 20% of graduates are likely to be financially worse off as a result of attending university
- A Degree Apprenticeship can reduce the 'opportunity cost' of university
- Young people who go to university seem to have lower levels of happiness and wellbeing compared to young people of the same age who do not attend university
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Where and when to apply?

Where to look for Degree Apprenticeships

Finding an apprenticeship is like looking for a job! There is no single place to look.

- <u>UCAS</u>



How and when to apply?

- Students often apply to an employer, not the university (both may be involved in the selection process)
- Unlike with UCAS, there is no familiar cycle of set dates and deadlines
- Not all vacancies will be advertised by the autumn of Year 13, so students may have to wait into the new year
- It's a good idea to have a UCAS application to fall back on (ideally submitted before the January equal consideration deadline) – this application can always be withdrawn later if necessary

Providing support

- Prospective degree apprentices might need to be treated more like job applicants than university applicants
- They might require support even after the usual UCAS support has stopped
- Interviews with employers may be different from university interviews, there could be:
 - online tests
 - telephone interviews
 - assessment days



Top tips

Your students may need to do the following:

- Play a 'numbers game'? Or 'quality not quantity'?
- Research the organisation they are applying for and do their homework
- Write online applications and cover letters
- Undertake subsequent selection process
- Deal with repeated rejection and 'application fatigue'
- Seek feedback from unsuccessful applications
- Manage their expectations
