#### **Kitchen Challenge**

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#### Write a story

Write a story, in your scrapbook, about your favourite memory or the best place you visited.

You need to include:

- A beginning
- A middle
- An end
- A setting
- Characters



Try and include the follow where possible:

#### <u>Simile</u>

When an object is compared to something similar in behaviour or appearance. A simile is often introduced by 'like' or 'as'

E.g. 'He was as quiet as a mouse'

#### **Metaphor**

We use a metaphor when we describe something with a word or phrase that means something in our imagination but does not really apply

E.g. Life is a box of chocolates or Bob is a lion.

#### **Personification**

When something that is not human is given thoughts, feelings and emotions that only a human can have, or when something is called he or she

E.g. The sun is smiling at us or the streets are calling me.

#### **Alliteration**

This is the repetition of the same letter or sound

E.g. They were furry-faced female foxes, or Seven silly snails sat singing silly songs

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#### Write about an adventure/trip
