






Developing good character in our students is essential for holistic growth and success – it shapes our students into well rounded, ethical individuals who positively impact society.

Attendance Matters at North Oxfordshire Academy

Why is 97%+ attendance so important?

Regular attendance at school means that you can make the most of your education and improve your chances in adult life.

School can also help you develop social skills such as making and developing friendships. A regular and punctual attendance pattern will help you when you enter the world of work.

The link between attendance and how well you do in school is clear. The more a pupil is in school the more they increase their opportunity to fulfil their potential.

What to do if you will be absent from school

Parents should contact the school as soon as possible if a child is going to be absent or late for any reason e.g. doctor, dentist and provide an appointment card. The school has a dedicated phone line for reporting absence.

We understand that some appointments are unavoidable i.e. with hospital specialists. However, appointments where there is flexibility such as dental appointments or eye tests should not be scheduled during the school day.


Punctuality

Arriving to school on time matters too. Being frequently late for school adds up to lost learning:

- Arriving 5 minutes late every day adds up to over 3 days lost each year.
- Arriving 15 minutes late every day is the same as being absent for 2 weeks a year.
- Arriving 30 minutes late every day is the same as being absent for 19 days a year.


Some Strategies to Improve Punctuality and Attendance

- Bedtime routines packing school bag ready for the next day, getting to bed earlier, setting a time for a television and other devices to be turned off.
- Morning routines setting the alarm earlier, no screen time until ready for school (and maybe not even then), having breakfast before leaving home, meeting a reliable friend to walk to school with.
- Coming to school for breakfast (8:15 am Canteen)

Home Learning Book




- The Home Learning book should be in the student's bag at all times

Home Learning

Students will receive a homework timetable at the start of the year so that they can plan and organise their homework each evening.

This will also be on the academy website.

Home Learning will be published on TEAMS and you will be able to see all your home learning in the Assignments tab.

There are Home Learning Clubs every day that all students are welcome to attend should they need access to computers or learning support.

Year 8 students will be set home learning for English, maths, Science, Humanities and French.



Each piece of home learning should take approximately 30 minutes.

Rewards

North Oxfordshire Academy uses a rewards system to recognise positive behaviour. Students will be praised for positive behaviour as part of our daily practices.

Purpose:

- To motivate and encourage students.
- To recognise students' effort and achievement above and beyond
- To reinforce the values, aims and ethos of the Academy.
- To recognise and reward student contribution and commitment to the Academy permeating through all aspects of school life.

Principles:

North Oxfordshire Academy seeks to ensure that:

- a positive ethos prevails through a culture of praise to raise selfesteem.
- all students irrespective of ability or background have equal access to rewards.
- the reward system is fair, meaningful, and consistently applied across the Academy.

The NOA Reward system looks to a provide a **world class education in character and academics** leading to happiness and fulfilment in life.

Respect Ambition Determination Merits

The aim of rewarding respect and community spirit is to recognise and promote the attributes and behaviours of a good citizen and to encourage students to be supportive members of a community. Verbal praise and positive language are part of our everyday routines and our warm but strict positive culture. Merits are rewarded and split into the individual subjects to recognise achievement in all areas of the curriculum. RAD is recognised by awarding **merits** and can be given to students by any member of staff in school.

Merits are logged on Arbor and when a student reaches each threshold of merits students will receive a badge and certificate in the Celebration Assemblies at the end of each Term.

Clubs and after school Enrichment

Enrichment is a very important part of the North Oxfordshire Academy experience, ensuring students have the opportunity to develop new skills, talents and character outside their formal

At North Oxfordshire Academy we offer leadership opportunities for every student, many of which come from the wide range clubs on offer. In addition to this every Tutor Group has a Form Captain and Sports Captain.

Regular attendance to clubs and activities is necessary for student development both academically as well as emotionally and socially. If you have chosen to attend a you should attend regularly and if you are unable to attend, please notify the staff member in charge so they are aware.

Students will be rewarded with Merits for attendance to clubs.

From Year 9 students are eligible to take part in the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme, which is a highly esteemed and rigorous programme designed to challenge your physical fitness, leadership, teamwork skills, personal development and your community involvement.



Uniform


Our aims for school uniform at NOA are:

- All students are ambassadors for NOA and are proud to wear our school uniform.
- Parents support the wearing of school uniform.
- The local community recognises NOA students.
- Students develop a sense of pride in their school and a professionalism to prepare them for the world of work.

Benefits of have a school uniform are:

- The differences between students are reduced, which in turn, reduces some of the causes of social isolation and bullying.
- Self-esteem of particular groups of students may be improved.
- Security is improved it's easy to spot who does and does not belong to the school community.
- Students feel a stronger sense of belonging and commitment to their school.
- It improves the image of the school in the local community.
- It creates a sense of purpose within the school environment.





Uniform:

- Navy blue academy blazer with the North Oxfordshire Academy badge
- Blazer sleeves must be worn rolled down
- A light blue long or short sleeved shirt. If wearing a tie the shirt must be fully buttoned. If not wearing a tie a revere collared shirt must be worn.
- Plain navy tailored trousers (ankle length)
- Plain navy tailored knee length shorts
- Plain knee length navy skirt with North Oxfordshire Academy logo at waistband (which must always be visible) or plain navy tailored trousers (ankle length)
- The academy grey jumper (optional in cold weather)
- Belts must be plain black or navy with no big buckles or logos
- If a tie is worn each house has a different coloured stripe which enables staff to recognise which house each student belongs to
- If a tie is not worn House identity strip above academy badge which must be ironed or sewn on at home
- Headscarf plain black or navy
- Blue, Black or natural coloured tights. No leggings or patterned tights allowed.

Footwear

- Must be black flat and plain shoes. (no boots) No trainers are permitted.
- There should be no logos, stripes/ticks or patterns on shoes. If you are in any doubt about the academy rules regarding shoes please contact your child's pastoral leader before purchasing them.

Other Items

Jewellery

- One plain gold or silver stud per ear in any location of the ear.
- One watch (watches connected to mobile phone technology must only be used for time telling).
- One discreet nose stud may be worn.
- No other jewellery may be worn.

Please note that jewellery will be confiscated and returned to the student at the end of the academic day or if necessary, a parent will be asked to collect from the academy.

Body piercings/tattoos

There must be no visible body piercings and/or tattoos. Tongue piercings are absolutely forbidden in school. Please ensure your child does not wear the following;

- Stretchers/expanders/bars
- Hooped earrings & ear cuffs

If you decide to allow your child to have an additional piercing to that allowed above, please do so at the start of the summer holidays so that it has time to heal and be removed when they return to school.

Nails

- No nail varnish (even natural colours) is to be worn in the academy at all.
- No false nails/acrylic nails may be worn at anytime.

Hair

To be <u>natural</u> – **no** unnatural colour, extensions, hair sculpture, decorative shaved patterns are not permitted.

Make-up

Year 7,8 & 9 – No make-up allowed at all.

Year 10 & 11 only light foundation and mascara may be worn.

False eyelashes are not permitted.

Summer Uniform Variations

The academy may permit students to stop wearing their blazers or make other uniform adjustments on a particular day. This will be communicated in advance via ARBOR to parents and carers. Shorts may be worn; they must be navy tailored shorts (length just above the knee) only with no additional pockets.

PE Kit

The PE kit is an essential part of each student's equipment.

PE kit must be brought to all PE lessons even if students are excused from PE as they will be expected to participate in student observations, coaching etc.

KIT LIST

Essentials:

- NOA polo shirt (sky blue) and/or NOA fitted polo shirt (navy with sky blue)
- NOA long sleeved rugby top navy with sky blue (optional)
- NOA hooded sweatshirt (navy)
- NOA shorts (navy) and/or NOA skort (navy with sky blue)
- Sports leggings can be worn under Skort/Shorts (no tights are allowed and must be removed)
- NOA socks (navy/sky blue hoops)
- Tracksuit bottoms (navy/black Plain)
- Footwear: trainers

Optional, but recommended items:

- Tracksuit bottoms (plain navy or black)
- Leggings (plain navy/black only allowed to be worn under shorts/skorts) No tights are allowed.
- Base layers (plain navy/black)
- NOA long sleeve polo shirt (navy with sky blue recommended for contact rugby lessons and fixtures)
- Shin pads and gum shields are available to buy from the PE department/Student Services
- Footwear: studded boots for football or rugby





Out of Uniform Procedure

If your child arrives at the academy out of uniform the academy will follow the process below:

- 1. Phone call to go home to parents/ carers
- 2. Student taken to student services to borrow uniform
- 3. Students are given 24 hours to correct shoes (if none are available to borrow) /nails/hair infringements.

Students must return any borrowed uniform at the end of the day.

If you have any issues regarding uniform, please call the academy to let us know in advance. Please do not send your child to school in incorrect uniform without contacting us first. We will do everything we can to help.

The NOA Library

The library is open every day 8.15am-4.15pm, before/after school and break & lunch.

Students can borrow up to 3 books at a time which must be signed out at the library desk.

We have a large selection of crafts and board games for use in the library.

Library clubs run every day after school. Current library clubs include: Board Games, Book Club, Creative Writing, Debate.

We run a popular student librarian program where students follow a nationally-recognised award programme and develop leadership skills. Students can apply to be a student librarian from Y8.

We have over **8000 books**, including a superb fiction and non-fiction sections, and we love giving book recommendations so please ask!

We also have an online catalogue, accessible via the student portal. Look for the Oliver button. Students can browse all the library books and renew and request books from there.



Anti - Bullying

- repeated
- intended to hurt someone either physically or emotionally
- often aimed at certain groups, for example because of race, religion, gender or sexual orientation

It takes many forms and can include:

- physical assault
- teasing
- making threats
- name calling
- cyberbullying bullying via mobile phone or online (for example email, social networks and instant messenger)
