Attendance Matters at North Oxfordshire Academy

Why is 97%+ attendance so important?

Regular attendance at school means that you can make the most of your education and improve your chances in adult life.

School can also help you develop social skills such as making and developing friendships. A regular and punctual attendance pattern will help you when you enter the world of work.

The link between attendance and how well you do in school is clear. The more a pupil is in school the more they increase their opportunity to fulfil their potential.

What to do if you will be absent from school

Parents should contact the school as soon as possible if a child is going to be absent or late for any reason e.g. doctor, dentist and provide an appointment card. The school has a dedicated phone line for reporting absence.

The NOA absence line is:

We understand that some appointments are unavoidable i.e. with hospital specialists. However, appointments where there is flexibility such as dental appointments or eye tests should not be scheduled during the school day.

Sixth Form absence line:

01295 234233

Students are expected to call in themselves each morning they are ill – emails are not accepted. Students should call the sixth form attendance officer directly on the number above and leave a voicemail if no one picks up.

Punctuality

Arriving to school on time matters too. Being frequently late for school adds up to lost learning:

- Arriving 5 minutes late every day adds up to over 3 days lost each year.
- Arriving 15 minutes late every day is the same as being absent for 2 weeks a year.
- Arriving 30 minutes late every day is the same as being absent for 19 days a year.


Some Strategies to Improve Punctuality and Attendance

- Bedtime routines packing school bag ready for the next day, getting to bed earlier,
 setting a time for a television and other devices to be turned off.
- Morning routines setting the alarm earlier, no screen time until ready for school (and maybe not even then), having breakfast before leaving home, meeting a reliable friend to walk to school with.
- Coming to school for breakfast club (starting at 7:45 am)

Home Learning Book


- The Home Learning book should be in the student's bag at all times

Your child will be issued with a Knowledge Organiser each term with all subjects in one booklet. Subject Knowledge Organisers can also be found on the academy website.

Home Learning

Students will receive a homework timetable at the start of the year so that they can plan and organise their homework each evening.

This will also be on the academy website.

Home Learning will be published on TEAMS and you will be able to see all your home learning in the Assignments tab.

There are Home Learning Clubs every day that all students are welcome to attend should they need access to computers or learning support.



Sixth Form: Home learning and Deadlines

Students are expected to spend 5 hours per week on their subjects outside of their lessons. A Level/Level 3 courses are a huge step up form GCSE and students should be spending this time during study to complete past papers, UpLearn, Seneca or consolidate their learning through activities set by the teacher.

Deadlines are set on Teams and students who miss their deadlines will have this logged and there will be a discussion with the head of year. *In some cases, persistent missed deadlines result in parent meetings to address commitment to learning concerns.*

Sixth Form: Study Periods

All students are allocated a minimum of **four study periods a week.** These sessions are to be independent study, supervised by the study supervisor in B1. Unsupervised study is in the sixth form and will still require students to work independently, but this will not be silent study.

We encourage students to bring their own laptops/chrome books for their study periods to support their learning. Financial support can be applied for through the 16-19 bursary find.

Rewards

The Reward system at North Oxfordshire Academy recognises acts of kindness, hard work and engagement with Extra Curricular activities.

Students will be given 'Acts of Kindness' cards by staff and this will be their raffle ticket for the weekly draw in assembly.

Students will also be rewarded for hard work and engagement in Extra Curricular activities using Merit points and they will be awarded to students using Arbor.

Each term, students will have Celebration Assemblies to reward students with the highest number of Merits overall as well as the highest number of Merits in each subject area. Celebration Assemblies will also reward for Excellent Attendance and Rank Order Assessment success.



Clubs and after school Enrichment

Enrichment is a very important part of the North Oxfordshire Academy experience, ensuring students have the opportunity to develop new skills, talents and character outside their formal learning environment. We offer a wealth of clubs including music, drama, sports, coding and debating.

At North Oxfordshire Academy we offer leadership opportunities for every student, many of which come from the wide range clubs on offer. In addition to this every Tutor Group has a Form Captain and Sports Captain.

Regular attendance to clubs and activities is necessary for student development both academically as well as emotionally and socially. If you have chosen to attend a you should attend regularly and if you are unable to attend, please notify the staff member in charge so they are aware.

Students will be rewarded with Merits for attendance to clubs.

From Year 9 students are eligible to take part in the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme, which is a highly esteemed and rigorous programme designed to challenge your physical fitness, leadership, teamwork skills, personal development and your community involvement.

Sixth Form Dress Code

We expect students in smart, professional dress whilst in the sixth form. All students receive the dress code upon applying for their place and again on induction day. By signing the learning agreement, students/parents confirm they are happy with the policy and students will adhere to the expectations:

- · Tailored Shirts
- · A Tie
- · Tailored Trousers
- · Smart jumper (no logos, sports brands etc.)
- · Smart Dress, Skirts of knee length (with tights), or Tailored Trousers.
- · Tailored blouses or Tops with Collars or high neck lines. Shoulder less / backless tops are not permitted. Tops should not have logos, pictures or other markings but should either be plain or lightly patterned.

For All

- · Jumper or Cardigan.
- · Blazer/Jacket.
- · Footwear should be plain and polishable.

Non-acceptable items of dress

- · Shorts
- · Mini-skirts
- · Jeans of any colour
- · Any item of Denim (including 'Denim look')
- · Fleece Jogging Pants/Bottoms/Hoodies (unless Football Academy uniform)
- · Jeggings (Leggings of any kind are only acceptable under a knee length skirt)
- · Vest Tops, Sweatshirts, T-Shirts
- · Sportswear (unless NOA sport uniform)
- · Excessively High-Heels, Flip-Flops, Trainers, (of any colour, including black), Vans, Nike, leather trainers of any kind, Canvas shoes, Ugg Boots, Sandals or any footwear with logos, stripes or patterns Fashion Footwear is not appropriate/ Dr Marten boots

Assemblies are every Monday and will cover current affairs, relationships and issues affecting young people today, including politics, friendships, etc.

One to Ones

Sixth form tutor programme runs every Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. Students are expected to attend a 'one to one' session with their tutor, which is scheduled (on rotation) on a Thursday or Friday tutor time. These 20 minute one to ones are not optional and require students to attend to discuss progress, careers, pathways and wellbeing.

Anti - Bullying

Bullying is:

- repeated
- intended to hurt someone either physically or emotionally
- often aimed at certain groups, for example because of race, religion, gender or sexual orientation

It takes many forms and can include:

- physical assault
- teasing
- making threats
- name calling
- cyberbullying bullying via mobile phone or online (for example email, social networks and instant messenger)
