

Attendance Matters at North Oxfordshire Academy

Why is 97%+ attendance so important?

Regular attendance at school means that you can make the most of your education and improve your chances in adult life.

School can also help you develop social skills such as making and developing friendships. A regular and punctual attendance pattern will help you when you enter the world of work.

The link between attendance and how well you do in school is clear. The more a pupil is in school the more they increase their opportunity to fulfil their potential.

What to do if you will be absent from school

Parents should contact the school before 8.40am if a child is going to be absent or late for any reason e.g. doctor, dentist and provide an appointment card.

We understand that some appointments are unavoidable i.e. with hospital specialists. However, appointments where there is flexibility such as dental appointments or eye tests should not be scheduled during the school day.

Sixth Form

Parents will need to contact the main attendance line to report a sixth form student's absence on each day of the absence.

Requesting an absence

Students in sixth form may request an absence (at least 3 days in advance) using the online Form which is shared on the student Team and website. Evidence must be uploaded to the Form or shown to the sixth form supervisor. Absence will be authorised for the following:

- Medical appointments
- Driving tests
- University open days or interviews
- Work experience

We encourage students to try and book appointments after school, or during unsupervised study periods so students do not miss important learning.

Punctuality

Arriving to school on time matters too. Being frequently late for school adds up to lost learning:

- Arriving 5 minutes late every day adds up to over 3 days lost each year.
- Arriving 15 minutes late every day is the same as being absent for 2 weeks a year.
- Arriving 30 minutes late every day is the same as being absent for 19 days a year.


Some Strategies to Improve Punctuality and Attendance

- Bedtime routines packing school bag ready for the next day, getting to bed earlier, setting a time for a television and other devices to be turned off
- Morning routines setting the alarm earlier, no screen time until ready for school (and maybe not even then), having breakfast before leaving home, meeting a reliable friend to walk to school with.
- Coming to school for breakfast club (starting at 7:45 am)

Character Sought - Clubs and after school Enrichment

Enrichment is a very important part of the North Oxfordshire Academy experience, ensuring students have the opportunity to develop new skills, talents and character outside their formal learning environment. We offer a wealth of clubs including music, drama, sports, animal care and science club.

At North Oxfordshire Academy we offer leadership opportunities for every student, many of which come from the wide range clubs on offer. In addition to this every Tutor Group has a Form Captain and Sports Captain.

Regular attendance to clubs and activities is necessary for student development both academically as well as emotionally and socially. If you have chosen to attend a you should attend regularly and if you are unable to attend, please notify the staff member in charge so they are aware.

Students will be rewarded with Merits for attendance to clubs.

The calendar is available on the Academy website.

From Year 9 students are eligible to take part in the Duke of



Edinburgh Award Scheme, which is a highly esteemed and rigorous programme designed to challenge your physical fitness, leadership, teamwork skills, personal development and your community involvement.

Sixth Form and Clubs

As part of student's volunteering enrichment, they are expected to attend 1 after school club a week and support in 1 KS3 lesson a week.

Students can sign up to whichever club they prefer, and will need to commit to this and role model to our students. The list of clubs are available to sign up for on the TSP day and students are able to switch clubs each term.

Sixth Form

Study periods

Students have 14 hours study time a week on their timetable, which is split between silent study and unsupervised study. Students are expected to complete prep work, home learning and coursework in these sessions.

Prep work

Material which is set for students to complete in advance of their lesson. This gives them their foundation knowledge and prepares them for the lesson content. This may include academic readings, research, textbook work or Up Learn.

Deadlines for prep, home learning and coursework

Deadlines are set to support students' workloads. Coursework subjects, such as BTEC and CTEC Level 3 will have internal and external deadlines which are set at the start of the year. Students who miss these deadlines will have this logged on Arbor and will be required to attend a catch up in a silent study period to ensure they are on track.

Persistent missed deadlines are an academic concern, and parents will be informed and invited in for a meeting to discuss concerns and look at how we

can support.

Sixth Form: Study Periods

All students are allocated a minimum of **four study periods a week.** These sessions are to be independent study. Silent study is located in the silent study room in B block, and unsupervised study is in the sixth form and will still require students to work independently, but this will not be silent study.

We encourage students to bring their own laptops/chrome books for their study periods to support their learning. Financial support can be applied for through the 16-19 bursary find.

UpLearn

We are committed to supporting students with their independent learning and have purchased for all Year 12 and Year 13 students Uplearn, which is an online platform which is proven to support academic outcomes.

Up Learn is purchased at no cost to parents, and students are expected to engage with at least 4 hours per week to support their learning in the following subjects:

Biology

Psychology

Maths

Chemistry

Physics

Uplearn is an interactive tool and is based on the science of learning. Students can track their progress, master content and then assess their understanding on complex topic areas.

Mock papers and exam questions support content videos and staff can track engagement and which areas require more revision. This tool is to be used alongside other revision resources, and is monitored by the sixth form supervisor.

- A light blue long or short sleeved shirt. If wearing a tie the shirt must be fully buttoned. If not wearing a tie a revere collared shirt must be worn.
- Plain navy tailored trousers (ankle length)
- Plain navy tailored knee length shorts
- Plain knee length navy skirt with North Oxfordshire Academy logo at waistband (which must always be visible) or plain navy tailored trousers (ankle length)
- The academy grey jumper (optional in cold weather)
- Belts must be plain black or navy with no big buckles or logos.
- If a tie is worn each house has a different coloured stripe which enables staff to recognise which house each student belongs to
- Headscarf plain black or navy
- Blue-, Black- or natural-coloured tights. No leggings or patterned tights allowed.

Footwear

- Must be black flat and plain shoes. (No boots) No trainers are permitted.
- There should be no logos, stripes/ticks or patterns on shoes. If you are in any doubt about the academy rules regarding shoes, please contact your child's pastoral leader before purchasing them.

Other Items:

Jewellery

- Students can wear plain gold or silver studs. Hooped earrings are not permitted.
- Students can wear one bracelet and one small ring. Necklaces are not permitted.
- One watch (watches connected to mobile phone technology must only be used for time telling).
- One small nose stud (Silver/Gold) may be worn.

Please note that jewellery will be confiscated and returned to the student at the end of the academic day or if necessary, a parent will be asked to collect from the academy.

Body piercings/tattoos

There must be no visible tattoos on show. Tongue piercings/septum piercings are not allowed in school. Please ensure your child also does not wear the following;

- Stretchers/expanders/bars
- Hooped earrings & ear cuffs

If you decide to allow your child to have an additional piercing to that allowed above, please do so at the start of the summer holidays so that it has time to heal and be removed when they return to school. Clear retainers are permitted.

Nails

- Natural nail colours (Beige/French/clear) polish is permitted.
- No false nails/acrylic nails may be worn at anytime.

Hair

- To be <u>natural</u> **no** unnatural colour, extensions, hair sculpture, decorative shaved patterns are also not permitted.
- North Oxfordshire Academy has adopted <u>The Halo Code</u>, the UK's first Black hair code.
 No Black staff or students should have to change their natural or protective hairstyle
 in order to thrive at our school. We hope that the Halo Code will move us one step
 closer to a world free from discrimination, where all Black members of our community
 have their identities fully recognised and celebrated.
- Students must not have eye-brow lines/hair lines/shaved patterns these are not permitted.

The Halo Code:

"Our school champions the right of staff and students to embrace all Afro-hairstyles. We acknowledge that Afro-textured hair is an important part of our Black staff and students' racial, ethnic, cultural, and religious identities, and requires specific styling for hair health and maintenance. We welcome Afro-textured hair worn in all styles including, but not limited to, afros, locs, twists, braids, cornrows, fades, hair straightened through the application of heat or chemicals, weaves, wigs, headscarves, and wraps. At this school, we recognise and celebrate our staff and students' identities. We are a community built on an ethos of equality and respect where hair texture and style have no bearing on anyone's ability to succeed."

Make-up

Students are permitted to wear light foundation and mascara only. (Discreet false eyelashes are also permitted.)

Summer Uniform Variations

The academy may permit students to stop wearing their blazers or make other uniform adjustments on a particular day. This will be communicated in advance via ARBOR to parents and carers. Shorts may be worn; they must be navy tailored shorts (length just above the knee) only with no additional pockets.

PE Kit

The PE kit is an essential part of each student's equipment.

PE kit must be brought to all PE lessons even if students are excused from PE as they will be expected to participate in student observations, coaching etc.

KIT LIST

Essentials:

- NOA polo shirt (sky blue) and/or NOA fitted polo shirt (navy with sky blue)
- NOA long sleeved rugby top navy with sky blue (optional)
- NOA hooded sweatshirt (navy)
- NOA shorts (navy) and/or NOA skort (navy with sky blue)
- Sports leggings can be worn under Skort/Shorts (no tights are allowed and must be removed)
- NOA socks (navy/sky blue hoops)
- Tracksuit bottoms (navy/black Plain)
- Footwear: trainers

Optional, but recommended items:

- Tracksuit bottoms (plain navy or black)
- Leggings (plain navy/black only allowed to be worn under shorts/skorts) No tights are allowed.
- Base layers (plain navy/black)
- NOA long sleeve polo shirt (navy with sky blue recommended for contact rugby lessons and fixtures)

- Sports Bra
- Shin pads and gum shields are available to buy from the PE department/Student Services
- Footwear: studded boots for football or rugby



Essential Equipment

We ask for the support of parents/ carers in ensuring children to come to the academy fully equipped and ready to learn. We have high expectations of our students, and if students fail to bring the correct equipment to school vital learning time is lost. We expect our students to take responsibility for their learning, and we also realise that future employers would expect workers to arrive at the workplace with the correct equipment.

Your child should leave home each morning with the following equipment:

An appropriate school Bag – (preferably a back- pack) Vital to keep all equipment and knowledge organiser in.

PE Kit - Please check with your child when PE is timetabled, so they pack their kit.

Refillable water bottle – Please send your child in to school with a refillable water bottle.

Out of Uniform Procedure

- 3. Students are given 24 hours to correct shoes (if none available to borrow) /nails/hair infringements.

Students must return any borrowed uniform at the end of the day.

If you have any issues regarding uniform, please call the academy to let us know in advance. Please do not send your child to school in incorrect uniform without contacting us first. We will do everything we can to help.

Sixth Form Dress Code

- Excessively High-Heels, Flip-Flops, Trainers, (of any colour, including black), Vans, Nike, leather trainers of any kind, Canvas shoes, Ugg Boots, sandals or any footwear with logos, stripes or patterns is not appropriate
- Sports caps, baseball caps and beanie hats
- Clothing with any Large Logo's, Pictures, etc









