Word	Definition	Example	Word in Action				
Semantic Field	A set of related words that can be placed into one category.	There is a semantic field of nature in 'In My Country' – 'waters', 'river', 'sea'					
Imagery	Visually descriptive language.	Kay creates vivid imagery for 'In My Country' to demonstrate her feelings towards being prejudiced.					
Personification	Attributing human characteristics onto non-human objects.	The use of personification in 'Not My Business' creates an emotive effect, and deepens the reader's understanding.					
Emotive Language	Language that evokes an emotional response in the reader.	In 'Nothing's Changed' the poet conveys tragedy through their use of emotive language.					
Confinement	A situation in which a person is kept somewhere, usually by force.	'I know why the caged bird sings' explores ideas about confinement.					
Freedom	The right to be able or allowed to do, say, think whatever you want to, without being controlled or limited.	'I know why the caged bird sings' is a poem about freedom.					
Anaphora	The repetition of words or phrases at the beginning of lines.	Osundare uses anaphora in 'Not My Business' to make the poem seem more direct; add a sense of bluntness.					
Alliteration	The occurrence of the same letter or sound at the beginning of words.	In 'Nothing's Changed' alliteration is used to distinguish the physical changes from societal changes.					
Enjambment	The continuation of a line onto the next without interruption.	The use of enjambment in 'Nothing's Changed' effects the pacing of the poem, and makes it seem increasingly urgent.					
Apartheid	A system of racial segregation (separateness).	'Nothing's Changed' features context related to apartheid, and teaches the reader about the consequences of prejudice.					
Liberation	The action of setting someone free from imprisonment, slavery, or oppression.	'I Look at the World' explores finding liberation within yourself in order to then liberate those who are oppressed.					
Allusion	Calling something to mind without directly mentioning it; an indirect reference.	The allusion in 'What Kind of Times are These' requires readers to know about Brecht's original poem.					
Rhetorical Question	A question asked to create a dramatic effect or to make a point rather than get an answer.	The rhetorical question in 'What Kind of Times are These' reflects Rich's political agenda.
